
# Elizabeth Shaw

# Reuse and Repeat

Megan Cope
Unbroken Connections

Unbroken Connections reflects on Megan Cope's family stories of Minjerribah (North Stradbroke Island) and the wider Quandamooka Country (Moreton Bay) over thousands of years, and the unbroken connections between family in an ever-changing world. Cope gives new life to important historical narratives by casting bones of her peoples' old ancestor Yungun (Dugong) in recycled television glass, noting the consequences of mass industrial extractive processes and the ongoing social, cultural and environmental impacts.

Through Sequence, Quandamooka and Mardigan artist Kyra Mancktelow represents a timeline of the Indigenous experience, specifically on Quandamooka Country. By responding to colonial intentions of the past, Mancktelow investigates the long-lasting legacies of colonialism and questions how we remember and acknowledge Indigenous histories, traditions, culture, and beliefs.


# **Living Memory**

National Photographic Portrait Prize

The National Portrait Gallery's *National Photographic Portrait Prize* exhibition is selected from a national field of entries, reflecting the distinctive vision of Australia's aspiring and professional portrait photographers and the unique nature of their subjects. This edition of the prize incorporates a year like no other: 2020. Accordingly, the title – *Living Memory* – acknowledges the period's seismic events.

Mei Mei Liu

Impression of Mangroves

Impression of Mangroves is a series of paintings by Brisbane-based artist Mei Mei Liu. Taking inspiration from Redlands Coast's unique environment, Liu reflects on her regular visits to Wellington Point (Cullen-Cullen) and observations of mangrove forests along the shorelines. Liu's unique painting style is a hybrid of elements learnt from her training in Chinese painting combined with other western techniques and influences.

# Rachael Wellisch

Polymorphic Magic: Textiles Transformed

Brisbane-based artist Rachael Wellisch unifies different techniques with shades of natural indigo dye. Wellisch uses discarded, threadbare clothes and worn out bedsheets that undergo alchemical altercations to refabricate into sculptures, hand-made paper and installations. While the works may suggest abstractions of nature, such as rock sediment or vistas of water, the materials offer a view on the relationship between textile production, consumption and waste.

# Fiona West

The Marvellous and Magical: Collage and the Moving Image

The marvellous and magical are characteristics of both puppetry and surrealism used by Fiona West within her ongoing investigations into lived experiences of displacement and belonging. West's exhibition features large-scale photographs and intimate projections that are handcrafted using a collage and puppet typology. Visual tricks, nostalgia, childhood desires, dreams and memories create a sense of whimsy and the fantastical that underpins West's migratory experiences.

Mark Kleine

Mestiza/Mestizo

Mestiza/Mestizo is an exhibition by Mark Kleine that acknowledges, interrogates, and celebrates the multifaceted nature of identity. Drawing from key components of Kleine's practice, the exhibition speaks to their lived experience as a 'mestizo' – a person of 'mixed' Filipino descent. This is expressed through photographic narratives that depict Kleine performing in a variety of guises.

# Sihot'e Nioge

When Skirts Become Artworks

Sihot'e Nioge reveals the centrality of nioge, painted, and sihot'e, appliquéd, beaten bark cloths in Omie culture and life from the first Omie man and woman who arrived on the earth until today. Working from the remote mountain rainforests of Oro Province, not so far from Kokoda, Papua New Guinea, the Omie Tapa artists continue to develop the most colourful and compositionally diverse, bark cloth art in the Pacific region, using all natural products from their vast, rainforest homelands.

## Woven

Works from the Redland Art Gallery Collection

Woven presents a selection of Papua New Guinean bags in the RAG Collection, including bilum bags and structured shoulder bags made from plastic fibres and pandanus leaves. Demonstrating both traditional and contemporary weaving techniques and materials, these bags serve a functional purpose as well as tell important cultural stories through the use of patterns and colours.






# **Shannon Garson**

Vessels and Bird Stories

Vessels and Bird Stories is an exhibition about making something from nothing, the process of creating in the studio from a lump of clay to a fine porcelain vessel covered in drawings. Shannon Garson encourages the viewer to explore the nexus between form and drawings. Her works reflect her observations of the Quandamooka shoreline, tidal wetlands, rock pools and longitudinal migration.





# Redland Art Awards 2022


Redland Art Awards is a biennial contemporary painting competition open to all Australian artists, presented by Redland Art Gallery. Redland Art Awards 2022 features four prizes, totalling \$22,000. The primary award is an acquisitive prize of \$15,000, with runner up awards of \$4,000 and \$2,500, as well as The Meredith Foxton People's Choice Award of \$500.



Julie Manning

Land Lines

Land Lines is a series of paintings and drawings by Julie Manning, which reinterpret and re-imagine landscapes from northern New South Wales, southern Queensland and Moreton Bay. Using mark-making and line as an underpinning thread, these semi-abstract works draw our attention to both artificial and natural forms in a landscape. Collectively, these mixed-media pieces invite us to imagine and re-define what is often seen as common ground.

# Richard Randall (1869 – 1906)

An Artist and Young Birkdale Gentleman Remembered

This exhibition provides an insight into the changing landscape, people and endeavours of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, as seen through the eyes of prominent artist Richard Randall. From an historically significant Birkdale family, Randall's determined, prolific yet short-lived career is celebrated through rarely seen sketchbooks and artworks. The exhibition is held in conjunction with this year's golden jubilee celebrations of Redland Museum.
